I am pleased to witness the publication of Issue 30, which is a special issue in collaboration with the Russell Berrie Fellowship program in Interreligious Studies at the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas in Rome, Italy. The articles herein were originally presented at an international conference celebrating the tenth anniversary of the fellowship at the John Paul II Center for Interreligious Dialogue.

The editorial and publishing team worked closely with Adam Afterman, who is the co-director of the John Paul II Center for Interreligious Dialogue and Chair of the Department of Jewish Philosophy and Talmud at Tel Aviv University, and Taras Dzyubanskyy, who teaches at Ukrainian Catholic University in Lviv, Ukraine, and is the coordinator of the international group of alumni of the John Paul II Center for Interreligious Dialogue. Together they offer an overview of the program and the articles in the Introduction that follows.

Between these two pieces will be a series of essays penned by more than 30 scholars, activists, educators, experts, and organizers from the fields of interreligious studies, dialogue, and theology. A virtual event celebrating this milestone will be announced through our various collaborating institutions (Boston University School of Theology, Hebrew College, and Hartford Seminary) and the JIRS website. Additionally, Seton Hall University's Institute for Communication and Religion is partnering with the JIRS to produce a podcast series tentatively entitled Inter/Sections. Episodes will feature discussions with scholars, activists, and educators in the field of interreligious studies, dialogue, and theology. The premiere episode will present a conversation with the founders of the JIRS, Stephanie Varnon-Hughes and Joshua Stanton, and Or Rose, current member of the publishing team. Details will follow, and so please, once again stay tuned!

Finally, I am delighted to announce our most recent CFP: "Interreligious Perspectives on Contemporary US Politics: (Inter)Religion in Social Movements, Political Organizing, and the Ballot Box." Please, navigate to our website (irstudies.org) for details.
